

Tentative Program for 2021 (all talks will be held virtually at 1:30 p.m.)

September Meeting:

We start the new season off with an exciting talk on black orchids by Dr. Leslie Ee from the Southern Ontario Orchid Society. He will talk about 'The Lure, Lust and Lasciviousness of Black Orchids'. Black orchids have always been mysterious and elusive. Their rarity in the past has attracted many to search deep in the jungles and to concoct ways to create them in laboratories, driving many to their demise. In this presentation, you will learn about the history of the black orchid mystique and their lure, and see what black orchids exist in reality in today's world. Leslie is no stranger to the Society as he has presented multiple times in the past to our Society.

Upcoming Events

October 2021: Henry Steger has agreed to give a timely talk on the orchids of the Ottawa region. Many local habitats are under pressure from encroaching development and we need to understand and value the diversity we have on our own doorstep as a first step to conservation.

November 2021: Betty Kelepecz from the Pacific South Orchid Judging Center in the United States will speak to us about the orchids of the Western Highlands of Papua New Guinea. Her talk is interlaced with interesting photos of some of the very famous orchids from this region as well as information about the unique and mysterious native tribes she met while on her orchid adventure. This is a fascinating talk that you will not want to miss.

December 2021: Annual Christmas party. It is hoped that by this time we may be able to meet face to face, but if that is not the case, we will still meet and have a fun social program virtually.

For January through to May, I am still finalizing speakers. We have extended invitations and are just waiting for answers. As of now, due to the fourth wave of COVID, our meetings will continue to be virtual. I am considering plant orders and am currently waiting for the City to tell me if we could have an outdoor sales event with vendors from Montreal and/or Toronto in late Septemberearly October. This would be held in an outdoor parking lot with proper distancing and masks for vaccinated members but we do not yet know if the City will allow this to take place. Hopefully, I will have some answers by the September meeting.

Virtual Show Table Update for October 2021

The October Show Table will follow the same format as last season, and we invite you to send in photos of your blooming plants once again. The deadline for entries will be October 10th. You can take and send in your photos any time between Thursday, October 7th and Sunday, October 10th. Please send your photos to Dave Cooper at orchidae@storm.ca. Remember to include your name as well as the full name of each plant (or NOIDif you don't have the name).

As a reminder please take two photos, one showing the whole plant and one a close-up of the flower. If possible, please send your photos as attachments to your email because I can then see the name of the image file. All members are welcome to participate and you can send in photos of as many plants as you wish, but they must arrive by the deadline.

We will have the same team of expert plant judges as last season: André Couture, Joyce Medcalf, Jean Hollebone, Marie-Josée Bergeron and Scott de Vito. They will judge all the photos in the same alliances we use for our usual Show Tables. They will award ribbons for first, second and third in each alliance as usual, as well as a rosette for Best of Show Table.

Zooming Information

We will be using Zoom for our meetings from September to November this year at least. Here are a few tips to make your experience enjoyable.

Before the Meeting:

- 1. Make sure your Zoom Client (laptop) or App (phone (not recommended)/tablet) is up-to-date. If you have not used it for a while, you might want to uninstall and reinstall it. If you are using a laptop or computer, you cannot use the App. You need the Client which can be downloaded at <u>Video Conferencing</u>, <u>Cloud Phone</u>, <u>Webinars</u>, <u>Chat</u>, <u>Virtual Events | Zoom</u>. Check out the Resources tab.
- 2. Register for the meeting as soon as you get the notice, which will be sent with the notice for Spike. You must enter your name and email. Register by Friday at 5:00 p.m. before the Sunday meeting. You will receive a confirmation email within 24 hours with the link to the meeting. If you do not receive it, please contact janet.johns@sympatico.ca well before the start of the meeting to find out why. I cannot trouble shoot and run the meeting at the same time!
- 3. You will be resent the link on the Sunday morning of the meeting just in case it gets lost in your email list.

During the Meeting:

- 4. Please log on at least 10 minutes before the meeting begins. You will be put into a Waiting Room until the host lets you in.
- 5. Familiarize yourself with the controls for speaker view and gallery view. Please keep your microphone muted during presentations and, if asked, also your video.
- 6. Questions can be put into Chat and you are welcome to use the Reactions which are fun. Please do not use any of the other annotation devices.

Thank You Dave Cooper

This is a good time to remind everyone of just how much we owe to our Past President, Dave Cooper. Dave joined the Orchid Society many years ago. He isn't even sure just when. He quickly offered his expertise in 1993 to run the Show Layout and in 1995, he assumed the role of Vice President and Show Chair; he has held the latter position since that time with a couple of years off here and there for holidays in Europe! He served as President in 1997-98 and 2016-2021. While he is not an orchid grower, he is an avid photographer of orchids in the wild – both here in Canada and in Europe, Italy in particular. His pictures are just Wow!

Recently, in his role as President, he developed and documented a process for Member Awards. He also continues to chair the Virtual Show Table, collecting, organizing and coordinating all entries, for the Virtual Show Table, which has been a great success and loved by all.

As Show Chair, he has led the Show Committees with a steady hand for many years. He was responsible for putting together the Show Layout, creating the Show Poster and in recent years, also assumed the responsibilities of the Vendor and Exhibitor Chair. He documents all the information for the Show including registration on the Website. The lists of winners are archived, and he uploads all the pictures provided by Arlene Lang for a comprehensive history of the Show.

Besides his leadership expertise, his skills in information technology and communications have been a *tour de force* for our Society. Back in 1995, he and the late Jeanette Arthurs rewrote the Constitution which is still in use today. Getting Ready for Winter

I - For those hobbyists having plants outdoors and intending to bring them indoors:

Make sure that the orchids are as healthy as possible before bringing them indoors. Check for slugs, sow bugs, earwigs and similar pests which could damage orchids.

II - Disease control begins in Autumn.

As days shorten and nights become cooler, certain orchids will become prone to rot beginning within emerging shoots especially if the shoots are vase-shaped and hold water. Be cautious watering such orchids. If night temperatures drop to 10°C or cooler, cold-susceptible orchids should be brought indoors. Some species are more susceptible to cold than others.

III - Pest control - Begins outdoors

Know your enemies – Snails, slugs, sow bugs, earwigs, blossom thrips and spider mites can be picked up outdoors but mealy bugs and scale will persist only from previous infestations. With the exception of slugs/snails, pests rarely cause a problem over summer but quickly respond to the absence of natural predators once plants move indoors. We must ensure that our plants are pest-free before bringing them indoors then be vigilant for any outbreaks thereafter.

IV - Before bringing indoors

Treat the outdoor growing area/pots with an anti-slug product for 2 weeks before bringing pots indoors. Immerse pots in tepid soapy water to eliminate sow bugs and earwigs (they will leave the container). Use fresh water to rinse afterwards. Clean pots and groom plants. Remove thrips-infested flowers. My strategy to minimize mites is to induce leaf drop in *Catasetum* and *Lycaste* according to their natural life style. The problem disappears with the old leaves that drop naturally. Foliage can be sprayed with soap solution but there may be eggs so vigilance over winter is always required.

Indoor success - placement, light, watering, feeding and humidity

Where and how you choose to raise your plants over winter will determine how healthy they can be. Windows provide weak morning sun, hot unrelenting afternoon sun, or even no sun at all. Supplemental lighting or shading may be required during winter months when the quantity of light is variable. Raising plants with only artificial lighting is another possibility.

V - For those hobbyists who maintain their orchids indoors year round either on a window sill, under lights or in a greenhouse:

Give your orchids a 'fall check-up'. Divide, re-pot, cull as needed. Look for pests that may have flourished while you were on summer vacation. Identify pests and treat as required. Examine your collection at least weekly for signs of disease and pests. Have a 'hospital bench' to isolate sick plants.
